Al Bustan - a Pre-Islamic cemetery, report of the Test Excavation 1991

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In 1983 Saef bin Muhammad al-Wahebi from the old village of al-Bustan brought some finds to the Ministry of National Heritage and Culture which he claimed derived from his property. Five years later Ghassan Sayid al-Ghassani and the writer visited the finder at his home in the new village with the purpose of learning more about the find. In about 1983, as a result of the construction of the al-Bustan Palace Hotel, the old settlement of the same name was demolished. The inhabitants were moved into new homes a few hundred metres to the north. Saef bin Muhammad now lives in Way 8310, House no. 701. He showed us the findspot. Maps of the area show two houses which no longer exist which bordered on the area we selected for excavation.

Directly at the foot of a rock outcropping locateable by its nearness to the northwest bordering wall on the property of the Al Bustan Hotel we spotted the surface traces of from 10 to 18 graves which seemed most likely datable to the Samad Period, to judge from their size and orientation. This provisional dating confirmed that of the finds, but for a single exception, which Saef bin Muhammad brought into the Ministry. A stone bowl (no. 4) dates to the Lizq Period. While his information as to the find circumstances cannot be confirmed, there is no good reason to doubt it. One of the roof stones of one of the graves (Bu1) stood open as a result of a recent robbing. The locals told us with little conviction that Indian workers had found a coin hoard here which they took away. In 1989 the open grave had been filled with concrete.

The area of the Pre-Islamic cemetery lies in an alluvial fan between the mountains and the beach. The investigated part of the cemetery is located in a shallow depression filled with about 1 m of recently deposited debris. The test area stopped where to the west and north the rock broke through the surface sediment.

The following finds were delivered to the Ministry by Saef bin Muhammad¹:

From 16 September to 3 October 1991 a salvage excavation was undertaken where one of the graves was opened by robbers. The investigation was financed jointly by the Department of Antiquities and the American Council of Learned Societies. The danger of building, landscaping, or grave robbing in al-Bustan, not to mention a partial confirmation that the finds in the Department actually derived from here all served as reasons for an investigation. In addition, the question arose if the Samad-Culture of the Interior also existed on the coast. Eight workers began the clearance of the surface around the robbed grave Bu1. We began excavation on the sport which seemed most likely to contain graves, and not be disturbed. Except for Bu1 none of the graves investigated were visible prior to the clearing of the surface. Compared to the known graves of the Samad Period in Samad, those here lay unusually close to each other, even overlapping. Bu1, Bu2, Bu3, Bu6 and Bu8 formed a row, each having a roughly east/west axis. Bu4 and Bu5 deviated and showed a roughly north/south axis.²

The designations of the types of graves also follows a standardized scheme. U=incomplete, S=stone ring, O=orthostatic lowest course of stones, R=bar wall atop the wall, W=roof support stones and cantilever stones, s=floor narrow (<1:2, breadth to length), g=floor broad (>1:2 breadth to length).

² The descriptions of the graves follow a standard order. In the first paragraph the find circumstances and preservation are briefly noted. Second, the architecture is described. Third the finds are described as the lay. They are described clockwise. The skeletal remains were identified by Prof Manfred Kunter of the University of Giessen. If not otherwise mentioned, the decoration on the pottery is impressed or incised. The pottery is normally hand made. If not otherwise identified, the metallic finds are of iron. In the catalogue red "copper" has not been analysed, some of it may be tin-bronze.

Architecture: Samad Grave type: Wg

Since the damaged roof of this grave was already visible, work began here first. Most of the stones of the roof were still in situ. The grave was robbed and contained a fragmentary grave inventory and few skeletal fragments.

The westernmost end of the chamber was sunk into the bedrock. Large flat stones of the roof rested on the roof support stones. Chamber walls consisted of broken stones. The roof support stones which stabilized the entire construction and the chamber wall consisted of wadi stones. An entrance costruction was not recognizeable. The floor of the chamber was rectangular with the eastern wall short wall a bit shorter than the opposite one.

This grave was robbed robbed, perhaps within the last 10 years. The Skeleton (LZ³ 156, 169, 175, 341) as well as the finds lay scattered on the floor. No finds were dispersed in the debris above the floor. Skull sherds, finger rings and a hair pin lay together in the western end of the grave, and it seems likely that that originally belonged in this end. Head and torso were oriented in this end. 20 cm from the western wall the pin (1) was found. Its point pointed to the north. Finger rings (2 and 3) were located 10 cm to the north. Although probably not in situ, a foot of a storage vessel (4) stood in the northwest corner. On the south side toward the mittle a ring (5) was found. In the southwest corner a few bones (6) were identified as sheep or goat. Near the wrist beads occurred (7). Beside the arms two cramps were found (11). Other finds including pottery sherds (8) came to light at different points on the floor. Some finds were sieved from the disturbed foor.

With the clearing of the surface debris the stone ring, fashioned of head-sized stones, came to light. A long river stone, part of the roof of the grave, lay still in situ in the ENE end of chamber. The roof was badly damaged and most of its stones were missing. For this reason and owing to the condition of the grave goods and the debris inside the chamber it is clear that the grave was robbed. The stone ring of Bu6 overlapped that of Bu2. In turn the stone ring of Bu2 clearly overlapped that of Bu5.

No trace of an entrance, such as a bar wall could be found. We can assume that the burial took place through the roof. Roof support stones and cantilever stones were clearly visible. At both ends of the chamber the walls were inwardly corbelled. Wadi stones formed the walls and half of the roof support stones. The other half consisted of worked stones. The floor of the chamber was roughly rectangular in shape. On the surface around the grave lay a ring of $w\bar{a}d\bar{l}$ stones.

Only two parts of seal shell were preserved of the grave goods. A few fragments (LZ 157 and 342) of the disturbed skeleton were identifiable.

Badly eroded, of all of the graves excavated in al-Bustan Bu3 was the most poorly preserved owing to its exposed stratigraphic position. Only the lowest one or two courses of stones of the burial chamber were preserved where they were sunk into the weathered bedrock.

The floor of the grave was irregularly ovoid in shape. Part of the chamber wall existed disturbed in the balk: A bar wall was visible. What was preserved of the chamber wall consisted of wādī stones. An irregular stone also seems to have surrounded the grave on the surface.

Apart from a single bead, neither skeletal remains nor grave goods were preserved.

This intact grave as well as Bu5 distinguish themselves from most other Samad-graves owing to a true stone packing consisting of head-sized stones placed directly atop the roof of the chamber. Over the centuries a layer of silt 10 cm thick sickered into the chamber. Both ends of the grave were overlapped by the neighbouring Bu7 and Bu9.

The roof was built of long river and worked stones. It rested on roof support stones balanced by cantilever stones. In the upper courses the chamber corbelled strongly inwardly. It consisted of three irregularly set layers. The short walls of the chamber were flat in the N end and rounded in the S end. A stone ring surrounded the grave on the surface.

The skeleton lay contracted with the back toward the E and with the skull to the S. Just before the forearms a balsamarium (1) lay on its side with the mouth toward the N. Directly beside it closer to the skeleton a stone bowl (2) still stood in situ. Beside the shins a large pitcher (3) stood which almost touched the roof of the chamber. Unusual was a depression in the floor beneath the pelvis. Here in 2 cm thickness a black powdery mass (4) occurred extending all the way to the feet as a thinner layer. In this mass two cramps (5) were found.

They more likely are to be associated with this powdery substance than with the damaged dagger (6) worn on the left hip.

Following the clearing of the surface Bu5 revealed itself as an irregular stone packing made of head-sized stones which lay directly atop the roof of the grave. Clay mixed with small stones separated these two stone layers. No trace could be found of a looting. Inside the chamber 20 cm of sediment had sickered in over time.

Conspicuous was the large oval stone ring encircling the cantilever stones. The roof stones were large broken slabs and a few flat river stones. It rested upon roof support stones, in turned stabilized by flanking cantilever stones. At the WSW end of the roof construction a low bar wall seemed identifiable which after closer inspection turned out to be simply piled up stones on the grave roof. The chamber wall was sunk irregularly into bedrock. At the N

end the bedrock serves as the base of the chamber wall. Two to three layers of river stones served as the chamber wall. The floor was oval/rectangular.

The well preserved skeleton (LZ 196) lay in the middle of the floor with the back turned to the SW. Near the face the deceased wore on one finger a ring (1). Directly before the forehead lay a copper bowl (2) aslant. NW of this also on the floor a bowl fashioned of soft stone (3) came to light. Animal bones and a cawri (4) occurred in the upper debris. These probably entered the grave with the help of rodents.

In the middle of the roof a flat roof stone was caved in probably as a result of the use of heavy earth moving vehicles used for the demolition of the houses proviously located on the site. Part of the flat stone was missing, and the grave was partially filled with stones and modern debris.

The roof the burial chamber consisted of flat river stones and broken stones which rested on a course of broad inwardly corbelled roof support stones. Cantilever stabilized the entire construction. The roof and cantilever consisted of unworked river stones. The chamber wall, in contrast, was built of three to four courses of flat broken stones. The chamber wall

rested on the bedrock. The floor of the chamber was irregular in shape and at the S end long stones jutted into the interior.

Attribution of grave goods to the three individuals in the grave is least certain for the earliest and most disturbed of them. For the final burial (skeleton 3) the grave goods of the preceeding individuals were pushed into the S end of the chamber floor.

Skeleton 3: Probably in situ at the time of the excavation were a bowl in soft stone (1) which stood vertically in the NW corner of the chamber. A foot and sherds of a large stretched pitcher (2) lay on the on top of the debris. It floated presumably here prior to the damage to the grave mentioned above. Also laying akip on the old debris was a pitcher (3) which probably also floated and tipped owing to the seepage of water into the grave. In the SE corner of the chamber in a rude niche a small bottle (4) stood apparently in situ. Directly in front of the stomach of the skeleton lay a ring (5) which owing to its position can be attributed to this skeleton. Between the elbows in chest height a necklace (6) occurred. On the right wrist the individual wore a bangle (7), and 10 cm W of this a second example (9) came to light not on the wrist. In front of the face beads were found (8). Perhaps on the left hand the deceased wore four rings (10) on one of his fingers. Beneath and behind the skull further beads (11) occurred, which belonged to this individual. They were worn in the hair or were embroidered on cloth. Beads also were worn behind the head at its base in bundles and occurred beneath the head strung. Some beads lay between the individuals 2 and 3 although the kinds of beads are most clearly associated with skeleton 3. A hair pin (13) lay behind the head of skeleton 3; its point pointed to the feet. Problematic is the attribution of a second hair pin (13b) to the skeletons 2 or 3, lying closest to it. Such pins belong to women's trappings.

Skeleton 2: This anthropologically male skeleton lay partly above, partly mixed with skeleton 3. Rings worn severally on a finger (15 and 16) lay before the face of the individual. A further ring (14) lay on the floor directly in front of the eyes of skeleton 2. An anciently broken dagger (17) and an arrowhead (18) remained at the hip. Nine flat clam shells (19) lay on the skeleton on the skull, tibia and in chest height.

Skeleton 2 or 1: Several finds could have belonged to skeleton 2 or 1 and cannot be individually attributed to the one or the other. Therefore they are listed together. At the W end of the grave floor a copper bowl (20) and two clay vessels (21 and 22) lying on their side seem to have belonged to one or both of these two individuals. Two groups of rings worn together on two fingers (23 and 24) also lay in disturbed position.

This little grave also was sunk into bedrock and surrounded by a stone ring which lay snugly around, somewhat higher than the cantilever stones. Seen from above the roof was intact. The chamber contained 8 cm of debris which sickered in over the centuries. On top of this two pottery vessels lay. The grave was undisturbed. The SW corner was overlapped by a modern wall.

Long, flat mostly river stones wedged together tightly with smaller pebbles formed the roof. The chamber wall stood two to three courses high and was low inside. Atop the chamber wall roof support stones were in evidence. Differently shaped irregular stones were used for the chamber wall. At the E end of the floor stones protruded into the chamber.

At the W end of the burial chamber atop the filling a vase (1) lay on its side, probably floated up as a result of rain water which had sickered in. In approximately the centre a pot with tubular spout (2) was standing also apparently lifted out of its original context. The skeleton (LZ 193, 200) rested closest to the SW long chamber wall, partly beneath the vessel (2).






Fig. 1a Plan of the area around the surface excavated Fig. 1b Plan of the immediate surrounding area




Fig. 2 Excavation plan prior to the lifting of the roof stones of the graves Fig. 3 Excavation plan after the lifting of the roof stones of the graves




Fig. 4 Strayfinds delivered by Saef bin Muhammad al-Wahebi to the Ministry of National Heritage and Culture in 1983




Fig. 5 Gr. Bu1, grave




Fig. 6 Gr. Bu1, finds





Fig. 7 Gr. Bu2, grave




Fig. 10 Gr. Bu4, grave





Fig 11 Gr. Bu4, graves and finds






Fig. 12 Gr. Bu5, grave and finds




Fig. 13 Gr. Bu5, grave








Fig. 14 Gr. Bu6, grave




Fig. 15 Gr. Bu6, grave




Fig. 16 Gr. Bu6, burial 3 finds




Fig. 17 Gr. Bu6, burial 3 finds




Fig. 26 scale 1:1, otherwise 1:3

Fig. 18 Gr. Bu6, burial 2, 1 or 2, attribution unknown finds






Fig. 19 Gr. Bu8, grave








Fig. 20 Gr. Bu8, grave and finds


